

We do hope you will have joined us and enjoyed the Burnin' Biscuit Jubilee as a thanks for your contributions. We hope to have a successful pledge drive this year, as it will determine the potential package we may be able to offer a part-time or potentially less than part-time minister. We have had to tap into savings this year and that is always a concern. As your President, I know it is for me. Thus far, we have managed to get through most of winter, although April can offer up some unusual surprises and snow removal is not cheap - a necessity, but not cheap. Costs for labor, electricity, heat, and the many, many things that our church requires to function never seem to decrease in costs. All this being said, many of you will have heard my demand for greatness this

year, and I believe we should have high expectations for our future. Since our last Unifax, we have been fortunate to have had Margaret and Ron Chiniquy use their plumbing talents in dealing with one of our restrooms, although the toilet will probably need replacing one of these days. Andy Culver also spied a loose shingle that Margaret and I were able to tar and put back in place - all signs of the wear and tear on our building - a building that is very good to us and so many others. It provides or has provided space for a number of activities including: fellowship, social justice activities, musical events, family gatherings, weddings and funerals. It gives space or has given space to renters including, AA, NA, Iglesia Apostolica, and others. Renters also play an important part of our budget. Our building serves as a space for community events, movies, discussion groups, educational sessions, conferences, poetry readings, book clubs. We are an employer - we affect the economy. Those boxes or little wicker baskets you see out there during our many drives, including those placed by the Social Justice Committee, provide food, clothing, toiletries, and snacks to the underprivileged and homeless. We serve Latino, Black, White, Native American, Gay, Straight - and Humanists, Buddhists (and many other "ists"), Christians, Jewish, Catholic, Mormons, Pagans, and many others, whom you may not even realize. It's important to remember that we remember we aren't just Unitarian Universalists on Sundays. We are UUCG all week. We aren't just about a pulpit. We are about community. We are about unity. Our 7 Principles aren't about taking, but rather I believe they are about giving - what we give to ourselves, others, and our community. In order run this little brick building, keep our employees, and pay for our overhead, we do need to replenish our coffers. We just do. UU's are an independent lot, but we also have to remember we are INTERdependent, as well. In order to function we need each other and as your President I need to tell you that yes, we also need your financial support. Plain and simple, we just do. You are the UU in UUCG. I won't sugar coat the financial challenges we may be facing in the upcoming year or the decisions, but I do believe we can achieve greatness. I hope you do, too. When you pledge this year, please consider giving a bit more than you think you can. Consider greatness. Do please remember we are also so very grateful for all your time and talents that you so graciously and unselfishly give to our community and congregation, as well. merchant. The rebates range from 2% to 16% and they all add up. King Soopers cards can be refilled at the store which means you can use your credit card for your purchase and get those mileage points we know you love! How can you help make this program a success?

Either way, the tradition of the UUCG Birthday Fund offers an opportunity to bless UUCG with an amount of money equal to the number of years of life (your own, or that of a person who has blessed you with their presence).

Our seventh UU Principle affirms “respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.” Maybe you would like to contribute in honor of another year in the life of your beloved pet, a beloved tree/river/garden, or some other way to honor the interdependent web of life?

Maybe you would like to honor the loss of a life you held dear (person, animal or nature)?

Maybe you would like to begin teaching your children about honoring the gift of life, UU principles, generosity, paying it forward, etc. by helping them contribute on their birthdays, or that of a pet or another part of the interdependent web when you are out in nature?

Simply write a check with “birthday fund” in the memo, or place cash in an envelope with “birthday fund” written on the outside. Each month as we report in the Unifax how much money we’ve taken in with pledges and offerings in the plate, we will also report how much we’ve taken in for our Birthday Fund.

Please help us revive this UUCG tradition which reminds us of the quote by Albert Schweitzer, “What we call love is in its essence reverence for life.”
