Ministerial Musings

Friends,

Well, fall was late and came in in a hurry, didn't it? I was glad to see from our attendance tally taken by our wonderful host volunteers that it hasn't dampened our enthusiasm or attendance. Folks even came out in the snow, which was inspiring. Our commitment to gather each week as a community is a really important aspect of keeping our sense of identity and, quite honestly, it is one of the really wonderful gifts that we bring to one another. Knowing that we are there for each other really gets us through, especially those who are struggling with other aspects of their lives. It is good to be together.

We've had quite a few visitors over the month and I am glad that they are being warmly welcomed. I have had the pleasure of speaking to some. They come in often from invitation and out of curiosity when they hear about us. Getting people to step in the door is an act of courage on their part; making a space for them at the table is an act of generosity on ours; maintaining the relationship is an act of love on everyone's part. May our faith community's life be filled with acts of courage, generosity, and love.

Our Living Generously program has already done some great work. Weston Edmunds who came to speak to us from the Weld Food Bank related how the bank is able to provide four meals for every dollar contributed and so, between our two services, our church was able to help with over eight hundred meals for folks this year. If you are interested in deepening your commitment, Weston encouraged me to remind you that he has volunteer opportunities to offer at the food bank. Our impact in the community has been even broader as the second half of the month, we were giving our plate to the Refugee and Asylum program at Lutheran Family Services. At the time of this writing, I can only imagine the impact we might have, but I will say that this is one of the programs that means a great deal to me. As many of you know, I worked on several cases as a law student trying to get asylum status for folks who fled really monstrous situations to a land they new very little about. Helping those individuals to acclimate to their new surroundings, as LFS does (and as our church has helped to do), is part of those amazing acts of courage, generosity, and love.

We've also been deepening our spirituality this month. Our first sessions of the Build Your Own Theology classes have begun and they will continue through November and early December. Folks have come with very open minds and hearts and the sharing has been tremendous. One thing that has been affirmed for me once again is the creativity of members of our congregation, which I am really impressed with. We'll continue to find new ways to deepen and expand our programing. I am going to host a Pub Theology drop-in discussion group; the location is yet to be determined, but it will be on the second Monday nights of the month at 6:30 p.m. I'll bring some discussion prompts on the monthly themes which will follow our worship themes and send reminders to those who indicate they want them. Finally, I want to acknowledge this month that the elections are here. As a nation we are going to make some decisions about who we want to be as a nation, as a state and as a community. I realize that for many in our congregation that this will be the culmination of years of work and for others it will be simply decisions of the day. I hope that everyone does make it to the polls to vote; it is, literally, the least we can do to make our world a better place (and yet I cannot help but acknowledge the hardships our society chooses to put in the way of this small act for many of the most vulnerable). Whether we are disappointed or elated, let us make sure to temper our feelings with the knowledge that the next day, we will be called again to remake our world as it is, less than it ought to be, but with a promise much greater than we have ever been - a world to come through acts of courage, generosity and love.

Your Board at Work

Thank you for all who attended the Congregational Meeting. It is necessary for us to tap the savings for the \$5,000 deductible to replace the roof and this required Congregational approval. For those who were unable to attend, the motion to do so was approved. We have had an inspection done, based on the recommendation of our insurance company and we do have damage. And, we also had noticeable previous damage, to which we had applied a band aid. I know I've learned more

about shingles than I probably ever wanted to this year, but it's just another part of the journey. These repairs should not come as a surprise, especially considering the millions of dollars of damage that impacted Greeley and the surrounding areas pounded with golf ball size stones and larger. We have gotten estimates and have been very careful to solicit them from local and reliable roofing companies. All this being said, the roof will probably not be able to be replaced until Spring as the roofing companies have their hands full right now due to the community wide damage. Still our building and its inhabitants continue to impact the community both locally and globally through the utilization of our building and our services, even in the short time we've covered in this Church Year. We're so fortunate to have such a legacy to help us continue the many things we do for the community - provide space for renters, non-profit groups, dedications and memorials - just to mention a few. And, we keep dreaming, too, of growth, expansion, and the future entrusted to us as a Board and congregation. I hope you continue to dream, too. Meet and greet the old and new faces you see and invite them to sit down and chat. Ask them who they, how they are, of just chat away and lose track of time. Ask them how they found us and then, let them know they are welcome to join us - always. In your own way, let them know how we as UU's plant sequoias.

Building Our Generosity Through Our Weekly Plate (And Helping Heal the World)

We are trying something audacious this year with our plate. Every service, rather than collect for ourselves, we will use the service to highlight outside charitable organizations and collect for their good work with our plate on Sunday. The plate funds contributed by the congregation over two weeks will by agreement be donated to organizations prioritized by local charitable organizations, UU, or disaster relief. This program will need members and friends to nominate possible recipients. The Board will ensure eligibility of the charitable organizations at the monthly meeting making sure they have non-profit status and meet one of the three criteria. Qualified organizations will then be eligible for selection. For October, the recipients will be Weld Food Bank and Lutheran Family Services. Afterward, qualified organizations will be chosen at random. To nominate a group, send an email to the office manager and include your name, their name, a contact person and the website of the organization.



Reviving the UUCG Birthday Fund

Our first UU Principle affirms “the inherent worth and dignity of every person.” This means that, “It’s a

blessing you were born,” as the catchy song we sing says! Blessings lead to gratitude, and the privilege of “paying it forward.” We say in our service each week, “we are blessed, and so we are called to be a blessing.” Have you recently been blessed with another year of life? Have you been blessed by someone else’s life? Either way, the tradition of the UUCG Birthday Fund offers an opportunity to bless UUCG with an amount of money equal to the number

of years of life (your own, or that of a person who has blessed you with their presence). Our seventh UU Principle affirms “respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.” Maybe you would like to contribute in honor of another year in the life of your beloved pet, a beloved tree/river/garden, or some other way to honor the interdependent web of life? Maybe you would like to honor the loss of a life you held dear (person, animal or nature)? Simply write a check with “birthday fund” in the memo, or place cash in an envelope with “birthday fund” written on the outside. Each month as we report in the Unifax how much money we’ve taken in with pledges and offerings in the plate, we will also report how much we’ve taken in for our Birthday Fund. Please help us revive this UUCG tradition which reminds us of the quote by Albert Schweitzer, “What we call love is in its essence reverence for life.
